

NARRATING/ VOICING YOUR SCRIPT

Before you voice/record your script, make sure you create a roadmap for yourself first:

Underline words you want to emphasize.

Show where you want to pause with a slash.

Annotate: write "slow" near areas you think you should slow down, giving the listener more of a chance to process facts or complicated information; write out words phonetically (fo-net-i-cally) that are hard to pronounce, etc.

Here is a student script example on the topic of extinction:

STUDENT 1: There are 20,000 species in danger of going extinct every day—a really big problem. The last mass extinction was 65 million years ago when the dinosaurs went extinct. A 10-kilometer-wide asteroid hit the Gulf of Mexico and sent the dinosaurs and over 75% of Earth's species into extinction. And now it is very possible that the sixth mass extinction is happening right now, but this time, humanity has become the asteroid.
